

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Dear Friends

'When we go to heaven, will we travel by car?', asked my 4-year-old son many years ago. (He is about to take his final exams at theological college, so I hope he has prepared his own answer now!)

I mention that because we have just celebrated Ascension Day, and Jesus' ascension back into heaven raises so many questions about the nature and the life of heaven, both now and in the world to come. One of those questions is, Did Jesus really ascend in his body? In his account of the ascension, Luke makes it very clear that Jesus did ascend in his risen and glorified body. 'This *same Jesus'*, he says, 'will return from heaven in the way you have seen him go into heaven.' And this has such an important bearing on our own future. This comes out very clearly in Paul's writing, especially in Romans chapter 8, but also from the apostle John. In his first letter he writes this:

Beloved, we are God's children now, and what we will be has not yet appeared; but we know that when he appears we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is. (1 John 3:2)

Here is a 'now' and a 'not yet'. We are God's children now, adopted by grace into his family through faith in his Son. We share the very status of Jesus as sons of God. In that sense we are already 'like him.' Astonishing. But John says that in another sense we are *not* yet like him. Only when he appears again will we be like him. So what will we be that we are not yet? The answer is that we will share his risen, glorified, imperishable bodily nature. Even more astonishing! I am so comforted that our future is not a disembodied, spiritual state; not some sort of being lost in the divine; but a real physical, glorified, Jesus-like future.

This is one reason (of many) why the ascension of Jesus is so important. His resurrection body is the firstfruits of ours and of many that are to come. His bodily ascension is the pledge that that future will come. What God has done for one, he will do for all.

So although Ascension Day always falls on a Thursday (40 days after Easter—if only Jesus had made it 43 days!) and therefore is easily overlooked, let's not overlook the ascension itself. It is so important. Our risen Jesus is reigning at the father's side, in his glorified state, a state which all his people will one day share.

Will we travel there by car? Actually, the movement will be in the other direction as Jesus returns to earth, bringing heaven with him. But that is a subject for a future letter.

Churches enjoyed bumper Easter attendances

Clergy have reported packed services over Easter, as increasing numbers of young people are coming to church.

It follows the recent survey by the Bible Society, which found that the share of the population who attend a service a month has risen from eight per cent in 2018 to 12 per cent last year. But surprisingly, the figures for those aged 18 to 24 have *quadrupled*, to 16 per cent.

Philip North, Bishop of Blackburn, said that the numbers at services were up by as much as a half in some areas. He said that, despite so much recent bad publicity about the Church, "there is such a hunger for faith, especially among the young."

The rector at one church in London said: "The world is a much more frightening and chaotic place than when I was growing up. People in their 20s and 30s have had two major financial crashes, a pandemic, a land war in Europe, a housing crisis. The world is not a place for optimism right now. The stability and comfort that God can provide is something that appeals to young people."

Churches certainly provide a sense of community, a social network as well as a spiritual one, which can help young people who are struggling to connect with others.

The Bible Society survey also found that Catholics may become the largest denomination in Britain, for the first time in 500 years. Anglicanism, on the other hand, could fall behind Pentecostalism, and become the UK's third largest denomination. The Anglican share of regular churchgoers of all ages fell from 41 per cent in 2018 to 34 per cent in 2024, while at the same time the Catholic share rose from 23 per cent to 31 per cent.

The Bible Society survey also found that, whereas in 2018 just four per cent of 18 to 24 year-olds attended church once a month, now 16 per cent of the same age group are doing so.


And, although British people are still more likely to be non-believers, those who are Christian are practising their faith with greater zeal.

Meanwhile, the Church of England has seen a boom in visits to its church-finding website, with views on AChurchNearYou.Com soaring. Visits last year hit 198.6 million – up from 128.1 million in 2023 and a rise of more than three quarters on the previous year. The figure does not include the 9.7-million-page impressions from the site's army of local editors, who maintain and update parish pages, adding and tagging worship services, events and community action projects such as food banks.



I (Kate) have been reading a book called 'Gentle and Lowly: The Heart of Christ for Sinners and Sufferers' by Dane Ortlund. There was a wonderful metaphor about Christ's joy in seeing sinners coming to him, which I wanted to share:

A compassionate doctor has traveled deep into the jungle to provide medical care to a primitive tribe afflicted with a contagious disease. He has had his medical equipment flown in. He has correctly diagnosed the problem, and the antibiotics are prepared and available. He is independently wealthy and has no need of any kind of financial compensation. But as he seeks to provide care, the afflicted refuse. They want to take care of themselves. They want to heal on their own terms. Finally, a few brave young men step forward to receive the care being freely provided. What does the doctor feel? Joy.

His joy increases to the degree that the sick come to him for help and healing. It's the whole reason he came. How much more if the diseased are not strangers but his own family? So with us, and so with Christ. He does not get flustered and frustrated when we come to him for fresh forgiveness, for renewed pardon, with distress and need and emptiness. That's the whole point. It's what he came to heal. He went down into the horror of death and plunged out through the other side in order to provide a limitless supply of mercy and grace to his people.

May we come to him broken knowing that he joyfully receives us!

Have you got your PhD yet?

In our society, having a Master's Degree or a PhD can improve our prospects at work; we can achieve higher positions, more recognition and (maybe) financial

rewards. But I remember a pastor saying that the only PhD that matters to God and pleases Him is the "Past having Doubts" degree!

Hebrews 11:6 "For without faith it is impossible to please God."

John 11:40 "If you believe, you will see the glory of God."

Romans 1:17 "... the righteous shall live by faith."

Mark 9: 23 "All things are possible to him who believes."

Mark 5:36 "Jesus said: Do not be afraid. Only believe."

Only you can decide to believe. Nobody can believe for you. Faith is an act, not a feeling.

You may ask: "You say the whole world is in His hands, but the world is falling apart! There is so much violence and suffering!"

Yes, but the world was beautiful and perfect when it was created by God. God did not mess up. Men did. It is all in the book of Genesis.

God is good, faithful and just, but His will does not happen automatically. The Bible says HE does not want anyone to perish (2 Peter 3:9), but thousands are perishing every day, laughing all the way to hell.

You may say: "I wish I had faith." You already do! We all have a measure of faith. We would not enter a plane if we were not confident that the pilot was able to fly that aircraft, nor would we eat food prepared by people we do not know.

So how does faith increase or get stronger?

Faith comes only by immersing ourselves in the Word of God, the Bible. No need to go to a Faith Conference somewhere or to ask someone to pray for you. Faith comes by hearing the Word of God (Romans 10: 17). That is the ONLY way to get rid of doubt and unbelief and develop faith in God, our creator, redeemer, deliverer, healer and Lord. **The input of God's Word needs to be greater than this world's input** –hours reading newspapers, watching TV, Youtube and social media only fill us with fear and despair. The Scriptures give us conviction of sin, strength, hope, joy and peace.

Aren't you tired of being let down by those you have trusted? Trust God, the only One who will never lie. He is good and He is faithful. Jesus says to you and to me: "*Have faith in GOD*." (Mark 11: 22)

- a day to honour and appreciate our fathers and father figures, such as grandfathers and fathers-in-law. Many of us will make a special effort to see them on the day.

No two fathers are alike, of course, but various polls across the internet reveal some interesting similarities of what people have most valued in their dad.

These traits include: being dependable, approachable, protective, patient, affectionate, honest, willing to listen, compassionate, and having spent time with them when they were young.

That's quite a list! People whose fathers had even some of those strengths have a lot to be thankful for. Thankfully, our Father in Heaven certainly has all those traits. Jesus said the Father is totally dependable and protective of us, longs for us to turn to Him, and is full of compassion and love.

The Suffering Church

"The Lord has done great things for us" Psalm 126:3

The Open Doors World Watch List for the Ten Darkest Places on Earth to be a Christian is brought to life by real stories about real people, who proclaim Christ and the truth of that verse above from Psalm 126.

Here are three inspirational stories.

Joo Min* grew up in North Korea where she had been warned to be fearful of Christian missionaries, warned at school that they were like wolves pretending to be sheep and were secretly spies sent to kidnap children and sell them into slavery. Joo Min grew up believing these tales and was understandably scared when she first met Open Doors fieldworkers in a neighbouring country where she had fled in desperation because of famine, looking for food and a job.

Having met the fieldworkers, she found someone more wonderful, Joo Min found Jesus. Despite all that she had been told she, courageously started attending Bible studies and accepted Jesus into her life. Even more courageously Joo Min, while praying, felt the prompting of the Holy Spirit to go back to North Korera, where she could face threats, arrest and even death. But Joo Min was determined to return home and share the Gospel and today Joo Min is a leader in the North Korean underground church, one with an estimated 300,000 – 500,000 members. "I know the risks involved" she says "If I am caught, I could end up in a labour camp, surviving in terrible conditions where the majority die"

Joo Min asks for our prayer, for protection and courage, so that she can continue with her ministry and be salt and light in a land overshadowed by darkness. "Lord God, please give Your protection and courage to all Christians who continue following You in a land filled with such spiritual darkness. Strengthen them as they share the Light of Christ. May North Korea change from a place of restriction and fear to a nation that overflows with praise. Amen."

Robbie* grew up as a Muslim in Somalia, putting all his heart in the teachings of the Quran, committing his entire life to it. But Robbie's' life changed when he got a copy of the Bible. He started reading it and shared it with other Muslims, who remarkably came to faith in Jesus before Robbie. Eventually he came to realise that Jesus was the truth and the only way to salvation. And his decision to follow Jesus was costly but he won't stop, wanting other Somalis to know the truth of the Gospel and to meet with Jesus for themselves.

All Somalis are expected to be Muslim, if you leave Islam your Somali nationality and even your sanity are questioned and Robbie spent three months in jail. It was the first of several jail sentences, where he was often brutally beaten. He was disinherited and rejected by his parents and his brother, who also converted was murdered for his faith. Robbie won't stop following Jesus, nor telling others about Him. Robbie asks for prayer to sustain his faith and the faith of other believers in Somalia, encouraging them all to be strong in Jesus.

"Dear Lord, please protect Robbie and all Somalis who follow Jesus, strengthen their faith and trust in You, particularly those in danger. Remember Lord, those who are suffering and persecuted because of the Name of Jesus and grant them Your presence and the presence of the Holy Spirit in their lives, daily. Amen."

There is a small growing number of Yemeni Christians including Zahra* who face persecution, arrest and torture if discovered. Zarah knows first hand how brutal persecution can be. She and her friend Anis* are passionate about spreading the Good News of Jesus in their village. "It was a fruitful time, and God was working through us" Zarah remembers. However extremists took over the town and Anis started to receive death threats. Threats weren't new to Zarah and Anis but this time Anis was murdered.

Despite this and constantly in fear for her life Zarah continues to lead in women's ministry. Although this puts her at great risk, witnessing the spiritual growth in the women she meets is a great source of joy for Zarah and has reinforced her belief in her ministry. "I am comforted and encouraged when I see how the Church in Yemen, though in secret, is growing. I believe God has put me in this place to impact the lives of these women for Jesus, to bring them His hope amidst the horrific situation we are living through" she reflects.

Zarah ask us to pray with her "Lord Jesus, raise up more women to help Zarah, give her the strength to continue and guide her to hear Your voice so that she can serve Him better.

A Living Hope

"Thank you Living Lord, we praise Your name and pray for India. We pray for Your church in India as they go through challenging times and are not able to minister as they would wish. Lord please change the situation so they may be able to pray openly, witness to Your Son and that they may spread Your Word to everyone in India. Lord bless them all and grant them Your grace, mercy and peace to them.
