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Dear Friends

"Remember the Lord your God . . . " (Deuteronomy 8:18)

With Remembrance Sunday just a week away, three brief thoughts from me.

First, I am always grateful for the opportunity to be grateful, once a year, for those who gave their lives for our freedom. We are so very blessed in our country, and in the West generally. I sometimes allow my mind to ponder the question, 'What if the Nazis had won?', and the possibilities are unthinkable. How deeply grateful we are, and how appropriate never to forget.

Second, I also have a niggling concern that Remembrance is almost becoming a new religion in its own right. Visiting our eldest and his family in Marlow last week we saw the park railings festooned in many hundred beautifully woven poppies. It was an impressive and moving sight. But as our country has so let go of God, are these rituals growing and growing and, devoid of God's place in it all, taking what is rightfully his? I may be wrong about this, of course, and you may disagree, but I do wonder.

Third, and in the light of that, as Christians let's always remember the Lord, 'who makes wars cease to the ends of the earth' (Psalm 46:9). As we worked through Lamentations recently we noted the importance of remembering the Lord, his character and his deeds. It is remembering what the Lord has done in the past that gives us the hope we need to move on into the future. In Moses's great and long sermon recorded in Deuteronomy, he enjoins the Israelites, again and again, to remember the Lord and what he has done; to remember their folly and his forgiveness; to remember their rescue from Egypt; to remember that they have what they have and they are what they are only because of him.

So, remember those who gave their lives with profound gratitude. And remember the Lord who so marvellously delivered us and enabled us to be what we are today.

The Suffering Church - Being a Christian - From David Barlow

Last month we read about the challenges individuals face for their faith in Jesus on a daily basis. Here are a few more stories of such sisters and brothers. As we put ourselves in their shoes we can remain thankful for the Jesus that sustains us.

Ming* is a Christian living in China.

"I'm on my way to the old place" is a carefully coded message that Ming would send to his contacts after loading his car with Bibles, whilst in a hidden alley somewhere in China. Knowing that the authorities were monitoring phones any wrong word could be costly. One day his worst fears were realised when Ming and his friends were arrested. Miraculously Ming was freed quickly but his arrest put him firmly on the authorities radar. Today they sometimes show up and search his home. In addition, Ming lost his business and his father in law prevents him seeing his wife and daughter.

Despite all this he remains determined to pursue his calling from God "I feel a heavy burden of taking a part in the Great Commission in Matthew 28: 19 – 21, which energises and encourages me to stay committed to the call of sharing the Gospel with my people" says Ming.

In China people are given incentives to inform on their neighbours and it means that many believers don't know whom to trust, adding to their isolation. "I need to make friends cautiously and identify the right people to share things with" says Ming "Since there are so many spies pretending to be Christians even in a Christian community, I must stay vigilant".

Ming asks us all to pray for him and all those taking the Gospel to their communities, especially in dangerous places. "Please pray for me, thank you for making me feel that I am not alone. Thanks to God for looking after me and making me feel secure"

Ming live lives very different from us, facing challenges we will probably never experience. The thing that binds then together is their faith in and love of Jesus who encourages them to live their lives for Him. Our lives might be different but it's the same Jesus who wants us to live our lives for Him. In much easier circumstances are we prepared to do that?

Leila * is a Christian in the Southern Philippines

When Leila left Islam to follow Jesus she had to keep it a secret – that was until her father discovered it earlier this year. He was furious, stopping her form attending church and a discipleship programme run by Open Doors partners in the Southern Philippines, where she felt safe. "I could be myself and learn about Jesus without fear" she says. Her father also enrolled her in a madrasah (Islamic school), sometimes threatening to disown her. Leila, now the only Christian in her family following the deaths of her grandmother and a cousin, who both shared her faith. "It hurst because I love my father, but I love Jesus too" she says. Leila continues to read her bible and pray secretly, recalling the discipleship lessons that taught her to trust God even in the dark times. "I know that following Jesus is not easy but I didn't expect it to be this hard. Every day I pray that my father will understand – that one day I won't have to hide my love for Jesus anymore".

Although Leila is unable to attend the discipleship classes anymore local partners are finding ways to support her discreetly. "I may feel alone but knowing that people are praying for me gives me strength " says Leila now, "it reminds me that I am part of a much bigger family in Christ". Jesus warned us that following him could put a barrier between ourselves and our family but knowing that doesn't make it any easier. Pray for Leila's continued resilience and that her father will encounter Jeus for himself and pray for your own family members who don't know Jesus for themselves yet.

Amina* and Shamaila* are mothers, both are just about surviving in Gaza today.

We read and hear about the untold suffering for millions of people in Gaza today due to a chronic shortage of food and particularly essential medication. Amna's six-year-old son desperately needed treatment for an acute fever and praise God Amina was able to access a medical clinic run by one of Tearfund's partners and she received the free medicine that her son needed. Amina thanks God for this provision and all those who helped her. "My family and I have endured unimaginable suffering during the war" Shamaila says "Our home reduced to rubble". Shamaila and her family have been forced to leave their "home" several times over the past two years as fighting breaks out near them, again and again. Shamaila's daughter was desperately in need of medicine to treat an acute infection who found help in another clinic run by a Tearfund partner, for which Shamaila is for ever grateful to them and to God. Thousands are suffering like Amina and Shamaila and their families, many from trauma and wounds caused by shrapnel and bullets in addition to more everyday needs. Pray for Amina and Shamaila, and for all those who are helpless in the midst of this conflict and pray for peace, peace that only Jesus can bring. And pray for all those brave people still bringing hope and help into this desperate situation in spite of the danger to themselves.

Ming, Leila, Amina and Shamaila face daily challenges we will hopefully never experience. The thing that binds them together with us is their faith in and love of Jesus who calls us into his family wherever we are in the world. A family not restricted by geography or time but one united by His Spirit. It's the same Jesus who wants us to live our lives for Him, are we prepared to do that?

Pray for all these people who follow Jesus in spite of all the challenges, knowing that Jesus is the Truth, the Life and the Way.

Jesus' followers in these countries remain faithful to Him in all circumstances and are helped in so many ways by the three organisations that our church supports, Barnabas Fund, Open Doors and Tearfund. 



In late 1914, WW1 erupted across Northern France and Flanders.

Great swathes of previously green fields and forests were blasted and bombed, leaving them bleak and barren, with seemingly every living thing destroyed.

But then in the Spring of 1915, something beautiful began to come out of all the destruction. Tens of thousands of bright red Flanders poppies began to put out tentative shoots across the endless vistas of mud. These resilient little flowers had actually

flourished in the middle of so much chaos and destruction, because their seeds grow when exposed to sunlight, through disturbances to soil.

We all know that these endless fields of cheerful poppies, growing in the midst of such misery and destruction, were what inspired the Canadian doctor, Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, to write the now famous poem 'In Flanders Fields'.

And it was McCrae's poem which inspired an American academic named Moina Michael to adopt the poppy in memory of those who had fallen in the war. She got it adopted as an official symbol of Remembrance across the United States, and worked with others who were trying to do the same in Canada. Australia, and the UK.

A French woman, Anna Guérin who was in the UK in 1921, caught the same vision, and planned to sell the poppies in London. There she met Earl Haig, the founder of the Royal British Legion, who was persuaded to adopt the poppy as its emblem in the UK.

The Royal British Legion, which had been formed in 1921, ordered nine million poppies and sold them on 11 November that year. Ever since then, the red poppy has been a symbol of Remembrance, of support for the Armed Forces community, and also of hope for a peaceful future.

In a Christian context, generosity is defined as the virtue of being liberal in giving, often associated with kindness, charity and selflessness, reflecting the character of God and is fundamental to Christian witness. Generosity is seen as a tangible expression of love and compassion towards others, reflecting Gods greater generosity to us.

2 Corinthians 9:7 states that "God loves a cheerful giver" suggesting that the spirit in which we give holds just as much value as the gift itself (See also Luke 21: 1 -4, the Widow's Offering). This perspective shifts our understanding of generosity from mere obligation to an opportunity for joy and gratitude.

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
